

In January 2020, the ASPCA® (The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals®) commissioned a national web-based survey conducted by Lake Research Institute to 1,000 American adults. This survey was intended to gauge public beliefs about the role of government in setting and enforcing clear food label definitions and supporting farmers transitioning to more

Survey results demonstrate that the majority of consumers believe the government should set and enforce clear definitions for food labels and support farmers transitioning to more humane practices.

- of consumers think the government should be enforcing clear definitions for food labels related to animal welfare.
- of consumers think the government should be supporting farmers transitioning to more humane practices.
- of consumers think public institutions should only purchase meat, eggs and dairy products from animals raised more humanely.

Survey results also demonstrate that both Republicans and Democrats believe that government should be setting and enforcing clear definitions for food labels, that institutions like schools and government agencies should purchase only animal-sourced products that were raised humanely, and that government should provide support to farmers looking to transition to more humane practices. Results show that support is similar across regions.

1. Do you think that the government should or should not be setting and enforcing clear definitions for food labels related to animal welfare?
